# Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

### What is the ADA Transition Plan?

The ADA Transition Plan is Scottsdale’s roadmap for identifying and removing barriers to accessibility in city facilities, parks, sidewalks, programs, and services. It ensures compliance with federal requirements of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and state requirements, promoting equal access for all residents and visitors.

### Why Is This Project Important?

Improving accessibility benefits everyone, including people with disabilities (visible and hidden), seniors, parents with strollers, and those with temporary injuries. The plan will lead to upgraded ramps, sidewalks, crosswalks, clearer signage, and easier access to city programs and services, enhancing mobility and connectivity throughout Scottsdale.

The plan covers:



**2,000** miles of sidewalks



**125** miles of multi-use paths



**160** miles of unpaved trails



**14,800** curb ramps



**593** signalized intersections



**17** pedestrian signals



**640** facilities and park structures

## What is the timeline for the project?

Jul. 2025 – Oct. 2025	Facility and program assessments, community engagement, and draft plan development
Oct. 2025 – Jan. 2026	Release of draft plan and public comment period
Jan. 2026 – Apr. 2026	Review, finalize, and begin implementing the ADA Transition Plan
Ongoing	Continued public input and barrier removal projects

## How does the city ensure accessibility during the process?

All meetings and materials are provided in accessible formats (e.g., large print, Braille, video calls with captions). The city will make reasonable modifications and provide auxiliary aids as needed to ensure effective communication for everyone.
