Initial Community Survey

What the First Survey Told Us

- Survey was open **May 11th – June 6th**
- **368** respondents
- **70%** were against the creation of a PTC PD
- **60%** admitted to not having educated themselves on the issue
- Comments Section (**26%** positive / **44%** negative / **17%** neutral / **13%** mixed)

Why These Results Need Caution

- Required demographic info discouraged participation
- Questions were oversimplified
- Survey allowed repeat responses
- Findings were not statistically representative

Why a New Survey Is Needed

- Clarify and balance the questions
- Remove barriers to participation
- Add safeguards against duplicate responses
- Ensure broader, more reliable community input

Respecting the present, preparing for the future

We hold great respect and appreciation for GCPD and the officers who serve on the front lines, often under difficult conditions shaped by staffing shortages and the demands of a growing county.

Our intent is not to diminish their efforts, but to recognize that while GCPD is doing its best with the resources available, it is our responsibility to ensure Peachtree Corners receives the level of service its residents deserve.

City Lite Then / Full Service Now

Peachtree Corners is incorporated under a 'City Lite' Charter

2012

2017

General Assembly amends city's charter, removing provisions that were determined to be invalid

- City now has full-service responsibility

2018

Office of Legislative Counsel for the Georgia General Assembly deems the "City Lite" concept to be unconstitutional

Responsibility for Police Services

Georgia Law: Cities (not counties) are responsible for ensuring police services are delivered to city residents



Direct / Indirect Options: Cities either provide police service directly (majority) or indirectly through IGAs with counties (minority)



City Council's Duty: Ensure that all contracted police services are cost effective and meet residents' needs



City Councils also have an obligation to investigate recurring and substantive resident concerns regarding police service performance

Peachtree Corners is not alone in this discussion

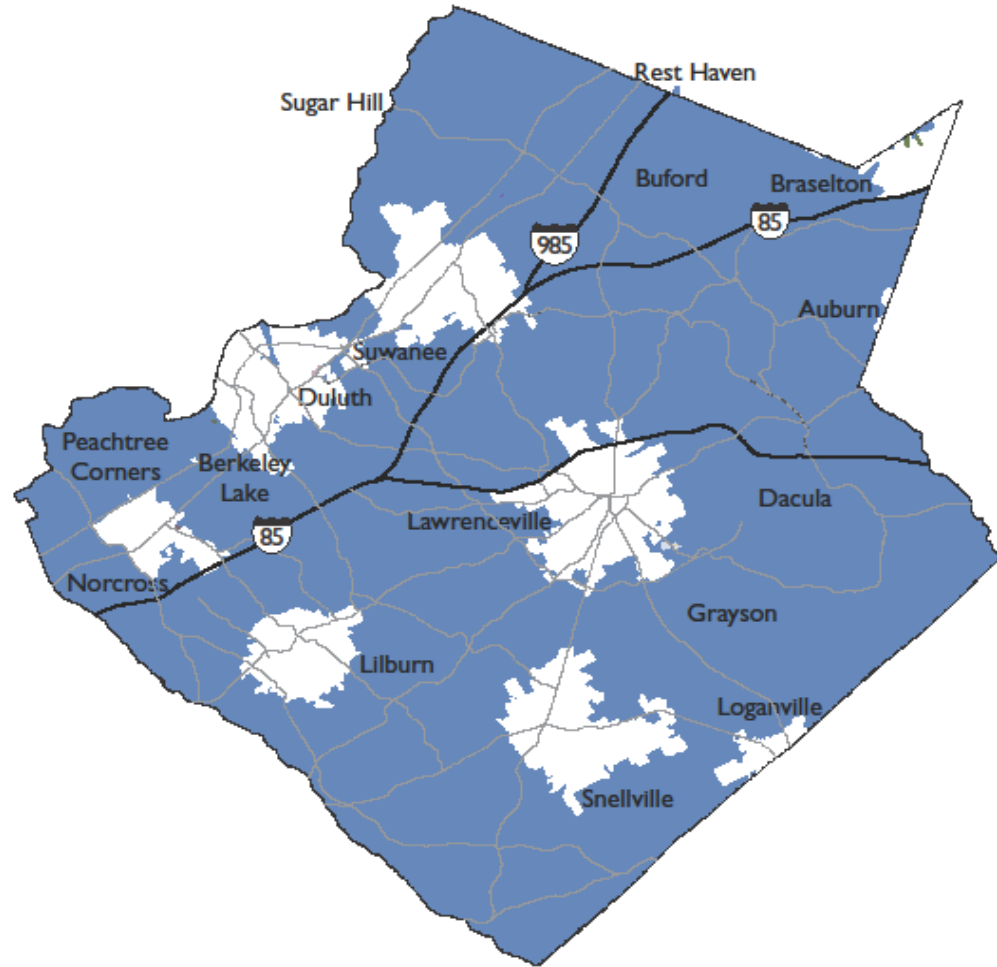
- Since 2005, many new Metro-Atlanta cities have formed their own police departments
 - **Sandy Springs, Johns Creek, Milton, Dunwoody, Brookhaven, Stonecrest, South Fulton**
- Others, like **Tucker** and **Mableton**, still rely on county police but are evaluating options
- Nearly **80% of cities in Georgia** operate their own police departments
- This is a **proven, well-established model** across the state and region

Intergovernmental Agreement between Peachtree Corners & Gwinnett County

- City agrees to join existing Gwinnett County Police Services District
- City allows County to levy a special police millage (“property tax”) on property in Peachtree Corners (2.9 mills)
 - County generates ~\$11M / year from Peachtree Corners (property tax + court revenue)
 - Police millage rate is subject to adjustment by Gwinnett County Commission
 - County raised police millage from 1.6 to 2.9 mills in 2020
- County agrees to ***“provide to the residents and businesses of Peachtree Corners the same police services it provides to the residents and businesses of the unincorporated area of Gwinnett County”***
 - No customization of police services by Peachtree Corners City Council
 - No city control over budget, staffing, patrol priorities, or communications

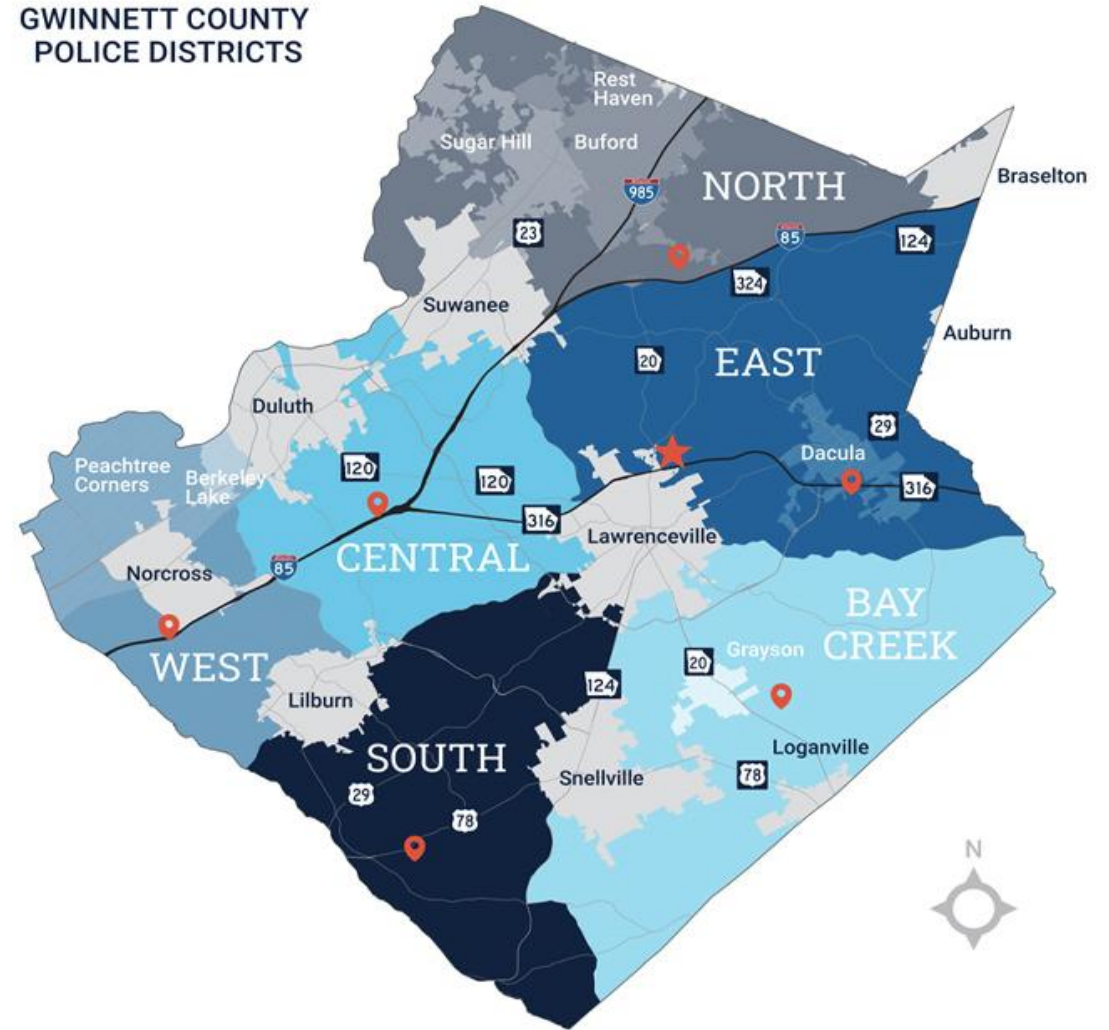

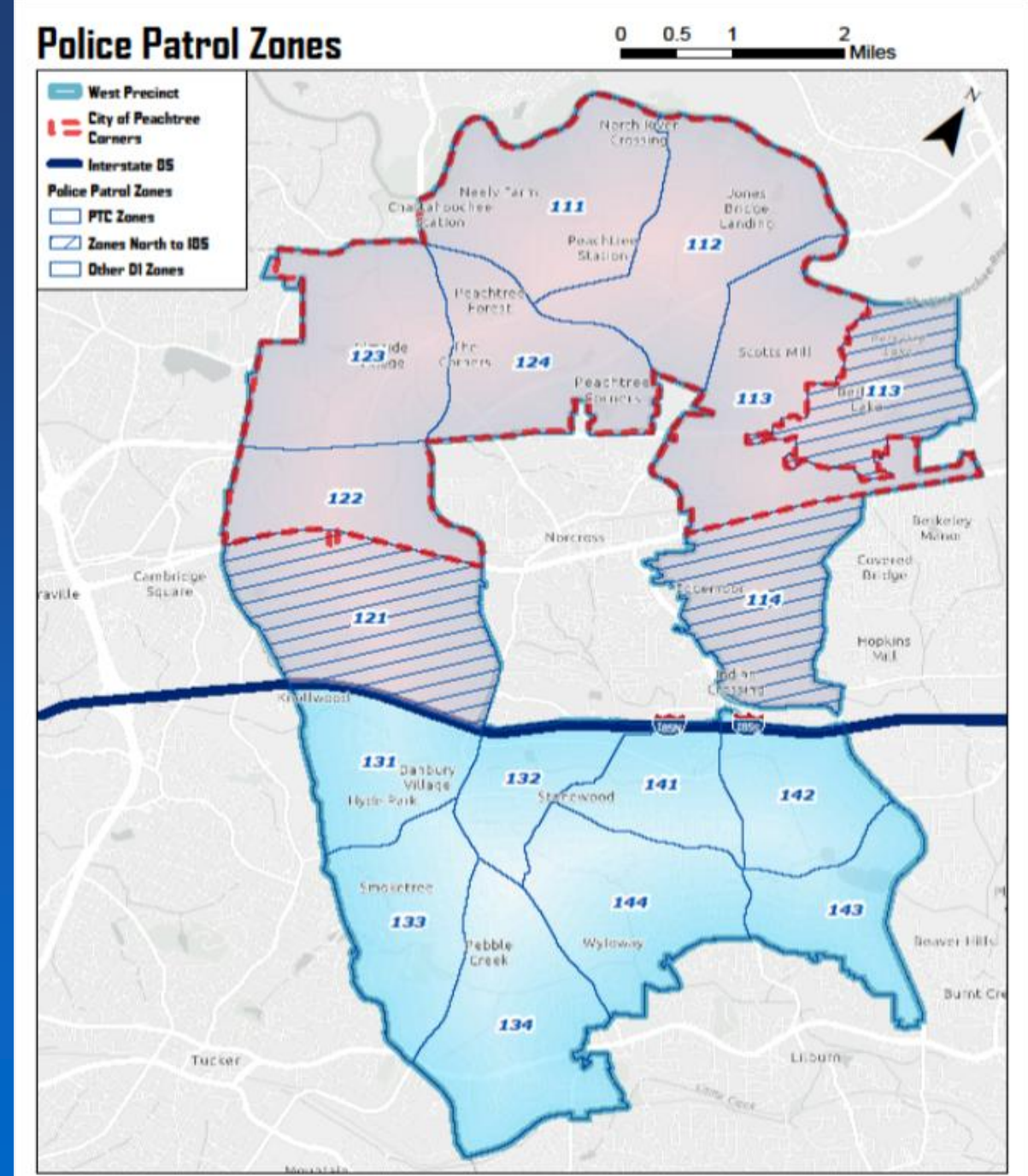

- Authorized Strength = **115**
- Filled Positions = **73**
- A majority of reported crime occurs outside of PTC city limits
- Resources from PTC patrol area are often pulled outside the city to serve the higher crime areas
- There are instances when PTC has zero (0) police officers patrolling it

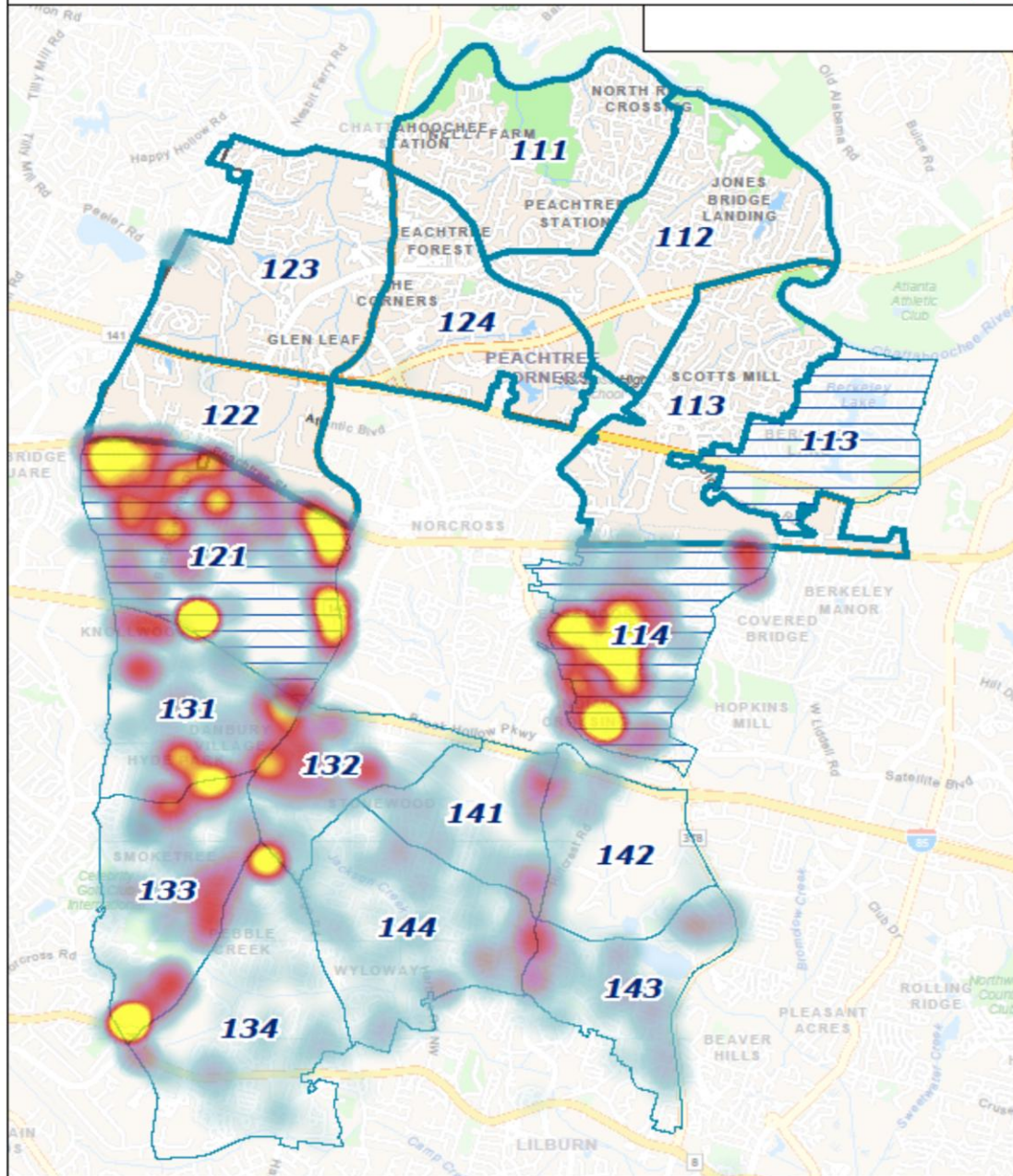

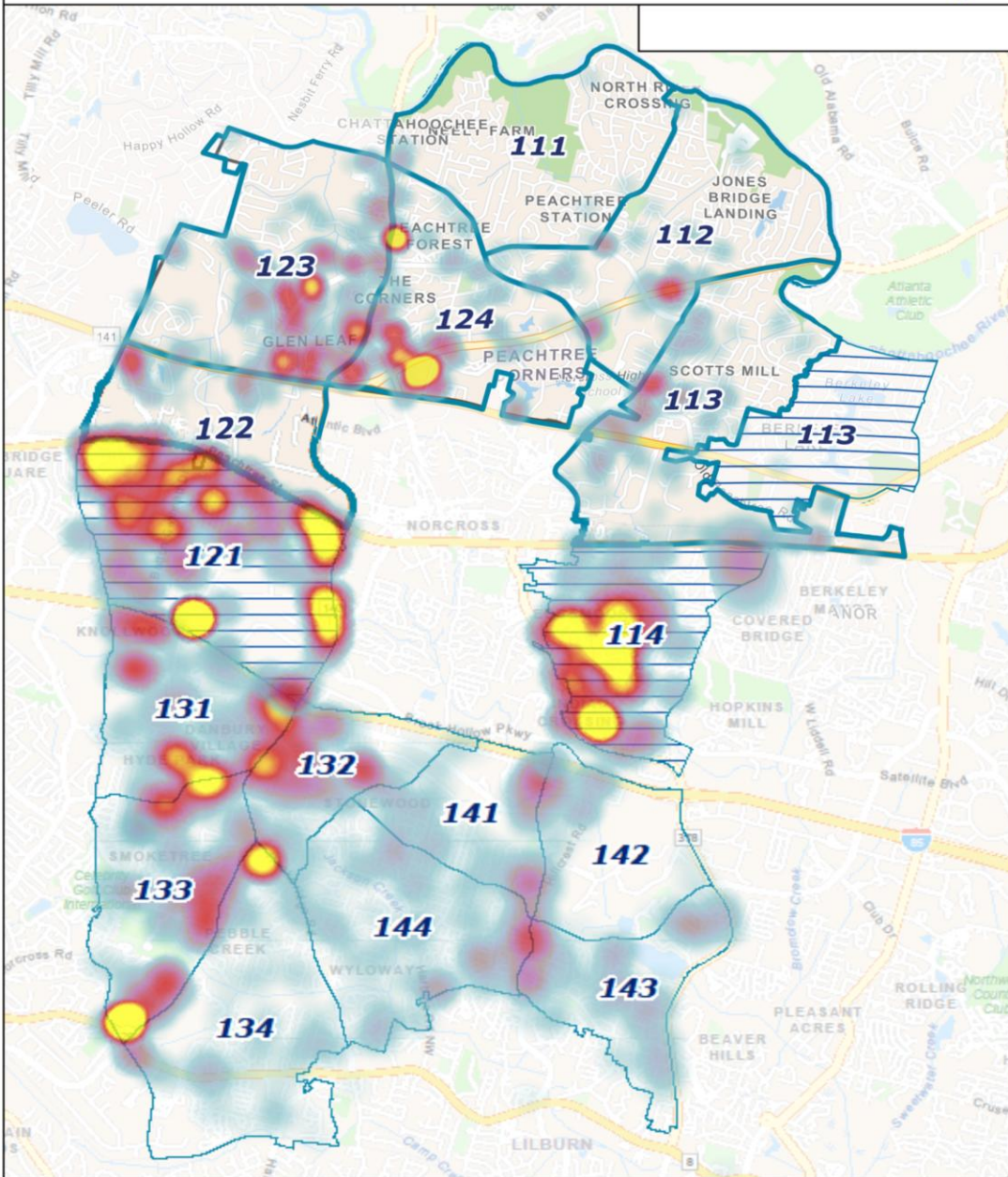
Year 2024 West Precinct South to PTC Crime Heat Map

- Pressure is building on Peachtree Corners

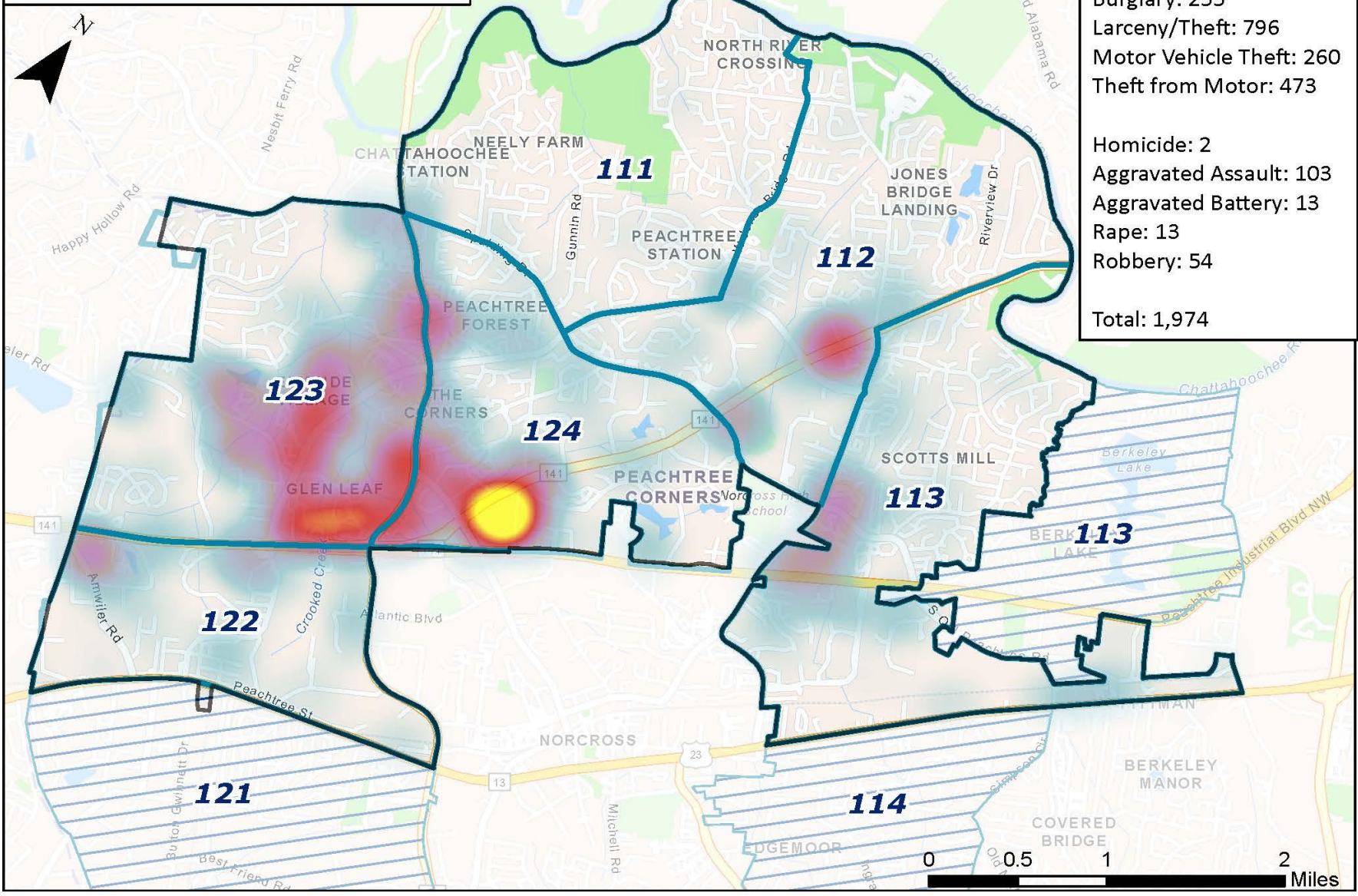
Year 2024 West Precinct South to PTC Crime Heat Map

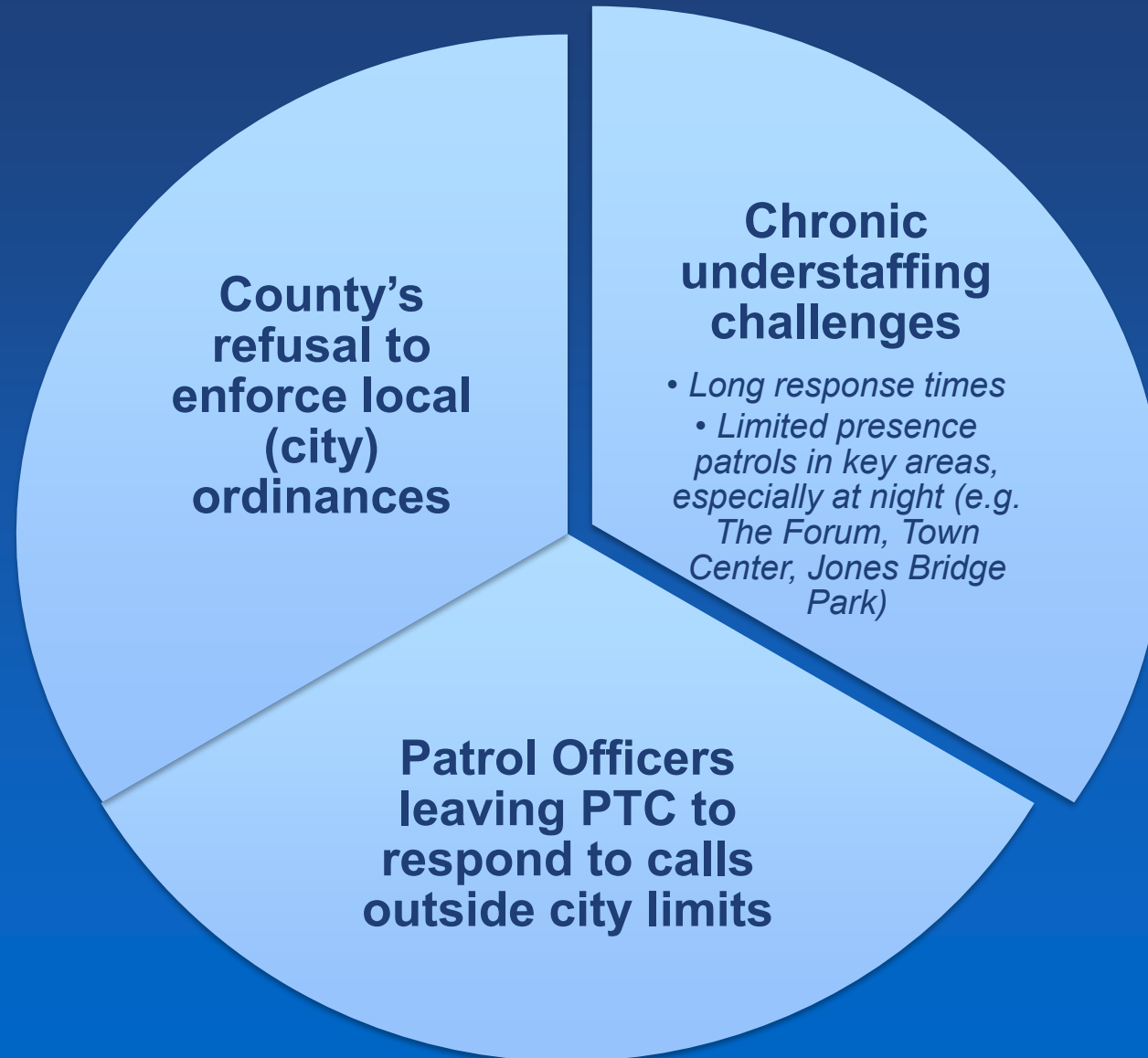

County's refusal to enforce local (city) ordinances

Chronic understaffing challenges

- Long response times
- Limited presence patrols in key areas, especially at night (e.g. The Forum, Town Center, Jones Bridge Park)

Patrol Officers leaving PTC to respond to calls outside city limits

Why the Marshal's Office Was Created

Established to supplement GCPD and fill enforcement gaps

- Goals:
 - Enforce local (city) ordinances
 - Act as force multiplier
 - Reinforce limited GCPD staffing
 - Increase police visibility in the community
- Staffed by POST-certified former GCPD officers

City Technology Investments

- Flock LPR / Video cameras, Fūsus unified platforms, and a Real-time Crime Center
- Designed to support GCPD efforts

County / City Marshal coordination challenges

City request for “read-only” access to Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) denied by County Administration

➤ Why CAD Access Matters

- **Real-time awareness:** CAD shows active 911 calls, officer locations, and incident updates.
- **Safety:** Without CAD, Marshals don't know if a dangerous call is happening nearby.
- **Response:** They can't proactively assist or respond to incidents unless they stumble across them or hear second-hand.

City request for “read-only” access to Records Management System (RMS) denied by County Administration

➤ Why RMS Access Matters

- **Investigations:** RMS contains official reports, suspect info, and case histories.
- **Timeliness:** Marshals only get reports days later via Open Records Requests, slowing investigations.
- **Crime patterns:** Without RMS, they can't see trends, repeat offenders, or organized crime activity in real time.

Incident Reports only made available to City through Open Records Requests (ORR)

➤ Why Timely Access to Incident Reports Matters

- **Timely details drive investigations** — officers need reports quickly to identify suspects and connect cases.
- **Delays allow repeat offenses** — criminals can reoffend while reports are tied up.
- **Patterns can be missed** — without access, it's harder to spot trends / organized activity.

Dear Chairwoman Hendrickson,

We are writing, on behalf of the City of Sugar Hill and the City of Peachtree Corners, to request “read-only” access to Gwinnett County’s Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) System for our respective City Marshal’s Offices. As you know, the CAD System plays a crucial role in law enforcement operations by facilitating efficient allocation of resources and timely response to emergencies. The Chief Marshals of both cities have recently reached out to the Gwinnett County Police Department (GCPD) to find out how to facilitate CAD access and suggested this letter as a way to formalize and authorize the request. We believe the bullet points below outline the benefits of extending CAD access to these Marshal’s Offices and highlight advantages for the respective cities, citizens of Gwinnett County, and officer safety.

The benefits to the Cities of Peachtree Corners and Sugar Hill are:

- Improved Response Time: Granting CAD access enables the Sugar Hill and Peachtree Corners Marshal’s Offices to receive real-time information about calls for service within their jurisdiction, which enhances the overall response time between different law enforcement agencies. This enhances information sharing, communication, and emergency response. Offices can accurately assess and ensure optimal utilization of resources during operations while maintaining the safety of the community.

- Enhanced Community Policing: CAD access facilitates closer engagement between law enforcement agencies and the community. The Marshal’s Offices can utilize CAD data to identify trends, prioritize community needs, and tailor policing strategies to address specific concerns, fostering trust and cooperation among residents.

Advantages for officer safety are:

- Situational Awareness: CAD access equips the Marshal’s Offices with crucial information about ongoing incidents, potential hazards, and the status of responding units. This enhances situational awareness for officers, enabling them to make informed decisions and adapt their approach to ensure their safety and the safety of others.
- Reduced Communication Delays: Direct access to CAD minimizes reliance on dispatchers for relayed information, reducing communication delays and enhancing officer responsiveness. Quicker access to critical data enables officers to anticipate challenges, coordinate responses effectively, and mitigate risks in dynamic situations.
- Comprehensive Incident Management: By accessing CAD, the Marshal’s Offices can obtain detailed incident reports, including location details, nature of the call, and relevant updates from other responding units. This comprehensive insight allows officers to formulate effective response strategies, allocate resources strategically, and manage incidents efficiently, ultimately enhancing officer safety.

It is also important to note that the City Marshals in both of our municipalities are P.O.S.T. Certified Peace Officers who have been through the same law enforcement training and certification process as that of GCPD Officers. In fact, many of our Marshals were hired after years of outstanding service to GCPD. The result is that our residents are being served by qualified, professionally trained, ethical, and competent peace officers who are actively involved in preventing and detecting crime, enforcing laws and ordinances, and promoting a sense of security and orderliness within our communities.

In conclusion, we believe strongly that extending CAD access to the Sugar Hill and Peachtree Corners Marshal’s Offices provides numerous benefits for the respective cities, citizens of Gwinnett County, and officer safety. By promoting collaboration, transparency, and efficiency in law enforcement operations, this initiative contributes to a safer and more secure community environment, aligning with the overarching goals of public safety and service excellence. Because of the benefits and advantages highlighted above, we would like to request “read-only” CAD access for our respective Public Safety Departments. While the Co-Delivery Strategy (SDS) Agreement in accordance with the SDS negotiated a few years ago resulting in numerous long-term stability for residents and but entered a Joint Resolution No. 1 (“Police Services Resolution”), a Police Service District (“Police 911 Services”) (“911 IGAT”) which

Pursuant to the Police and the City of Sugar Hill are As the agreed upon service per Police Department, provide Agreement to Provide 911 Service point for all 911 calls and dispatch to respond to police calls is to raise duplication of services these joint resolutions and if

consent of Gwinnett County and all cities which are parties to the joint resolutions and intergovernmental agreements. Additional separate agreements may only be entered into where those agreements do not abridge or impact the rights of other jurisdictions, which are parties to the agreement. Providing CAD access to your City Marshals will increase costs and place additional duties on the Gwinnett County Police Department not contemplated by the agreements, such as added training responsibilities and oversight to ensure that the use of the CAD system remains compliant with GBI and FBI rules and regulations with respect to the sensitive information that may be transmitted over the CAD system. These additional responsibilities would result in added costs and would require modifying the SDS Agreement as a whole, as any separate agreement has the potential to impact the rights of the other jurisdictions.

Aside from the SDS Agreement, Gwinnett County is concerned that providing CAD system access to your City Marshals has the potential to negatively impact the safety of the County’s police officers and/or other emergency responders. City Marshals responding to calls or information transmitted over the CAD system without the County’s dispatch, police or other emergency responders knowledge has the potential to create confusion and possible dangerous situations for your City Marshals and the County’s police officers and/or other first responders.

Due to the SDS Agreements currently in effect and the potential safety issues created by providing CAD system access to your City Marshals, Gwinnett County is unable to provide the requested CAD access. The County is committed to providing exceptional public safety and law enforcement services to all County residents in accordance with the SDS Agreement. In addition, our Police Department is dedicated to working with your City Marshal’s Offices to develop strong relationships and provide services pursuant to our mutually agreed upon SDS Agreement.

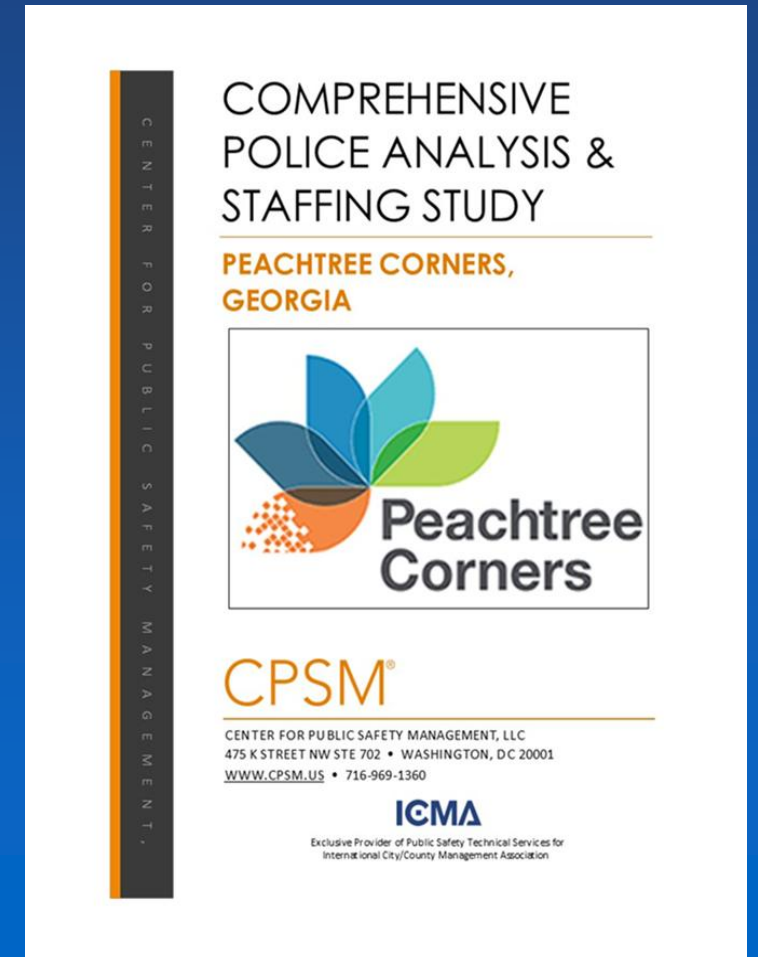

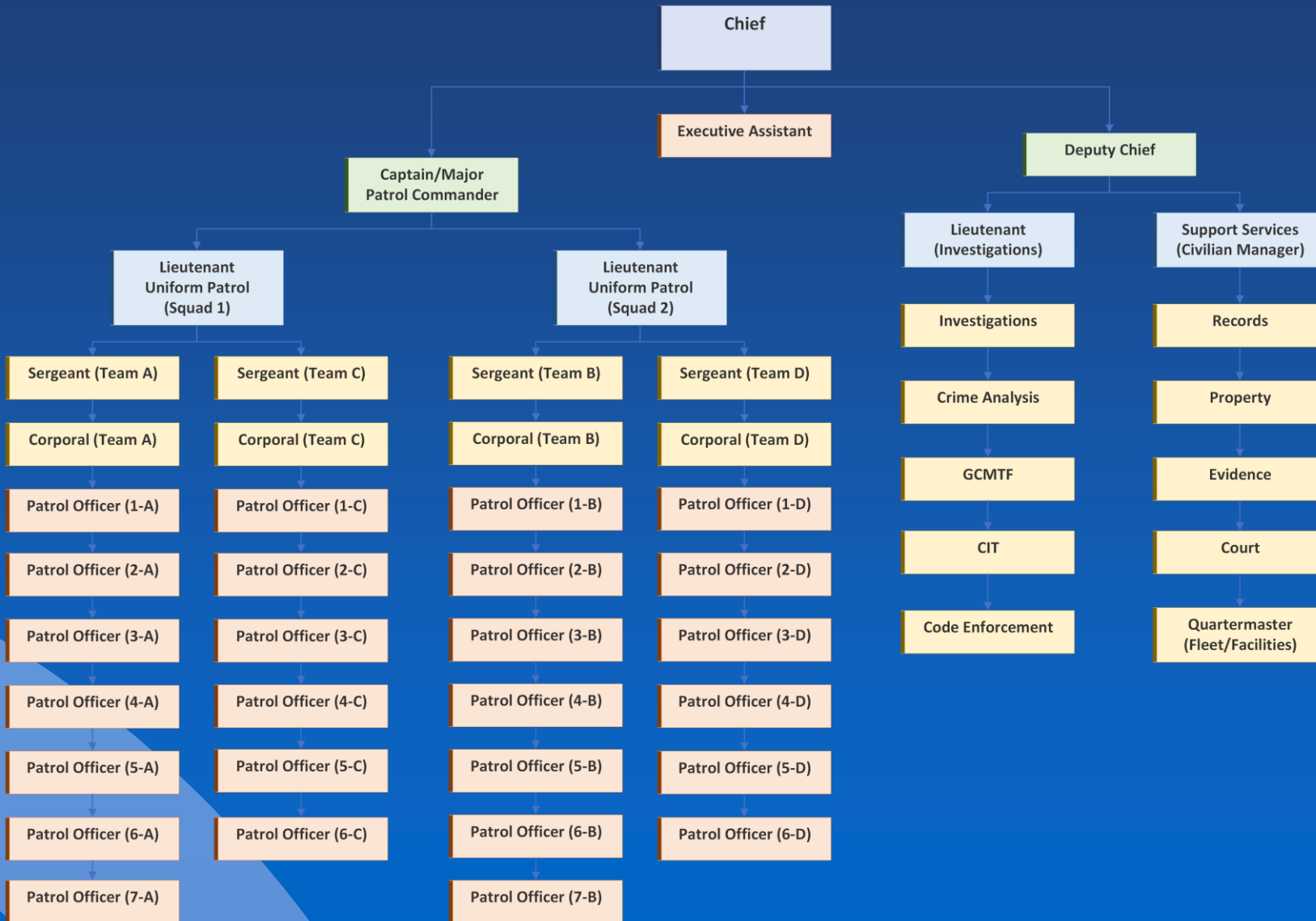

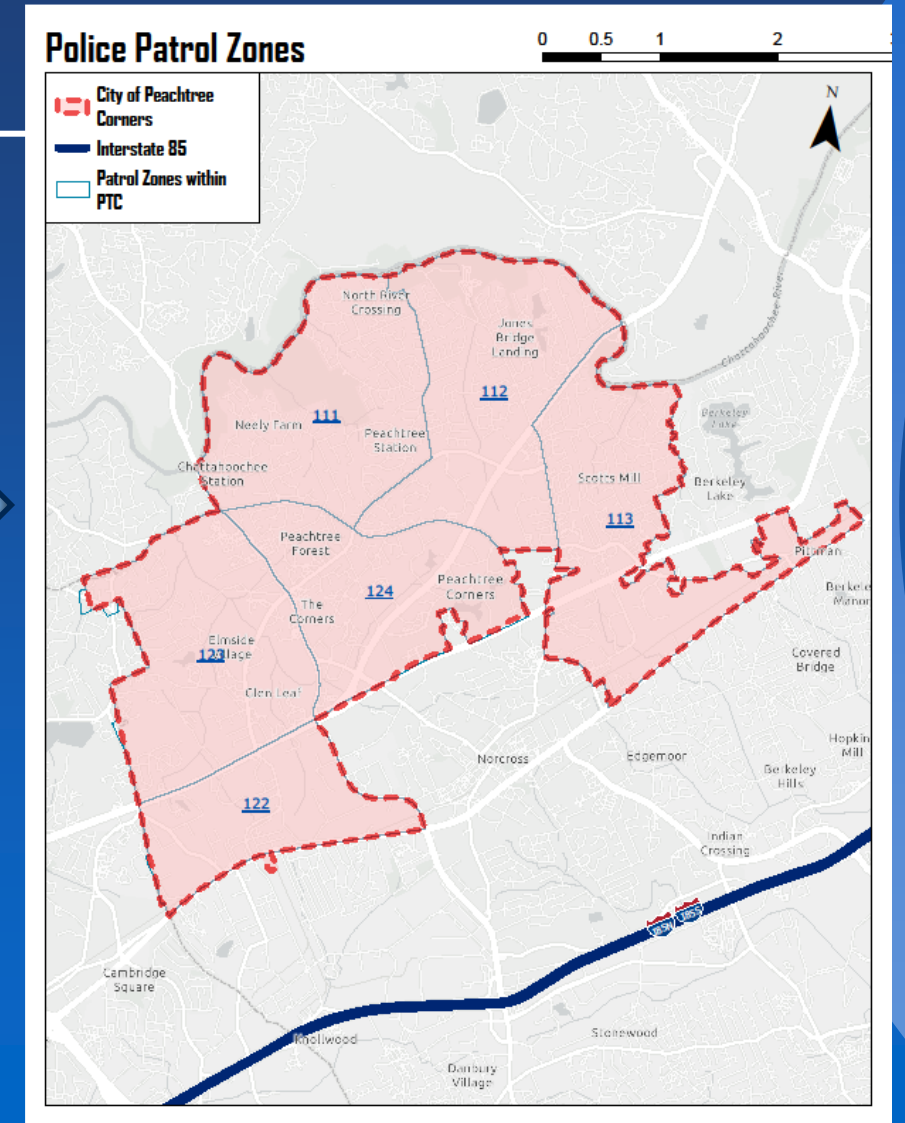

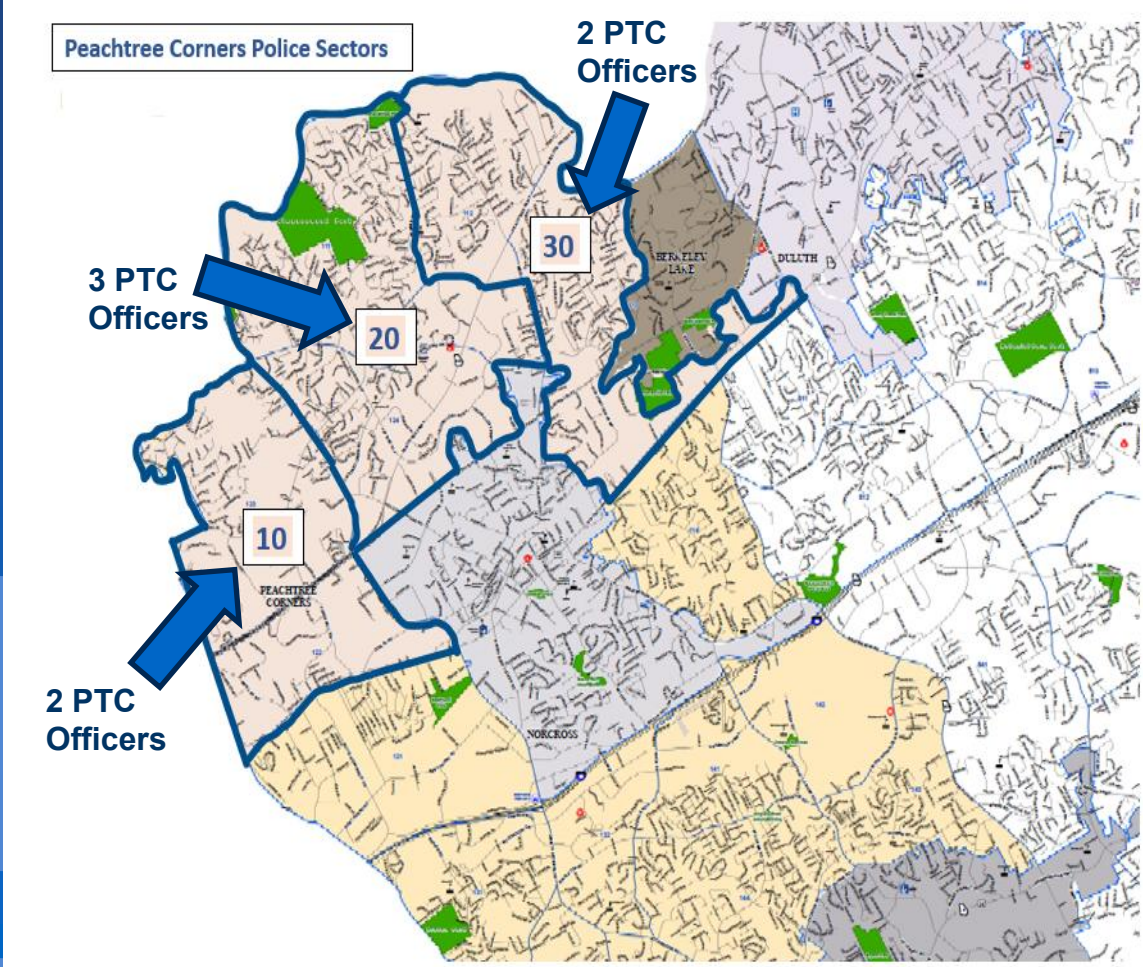
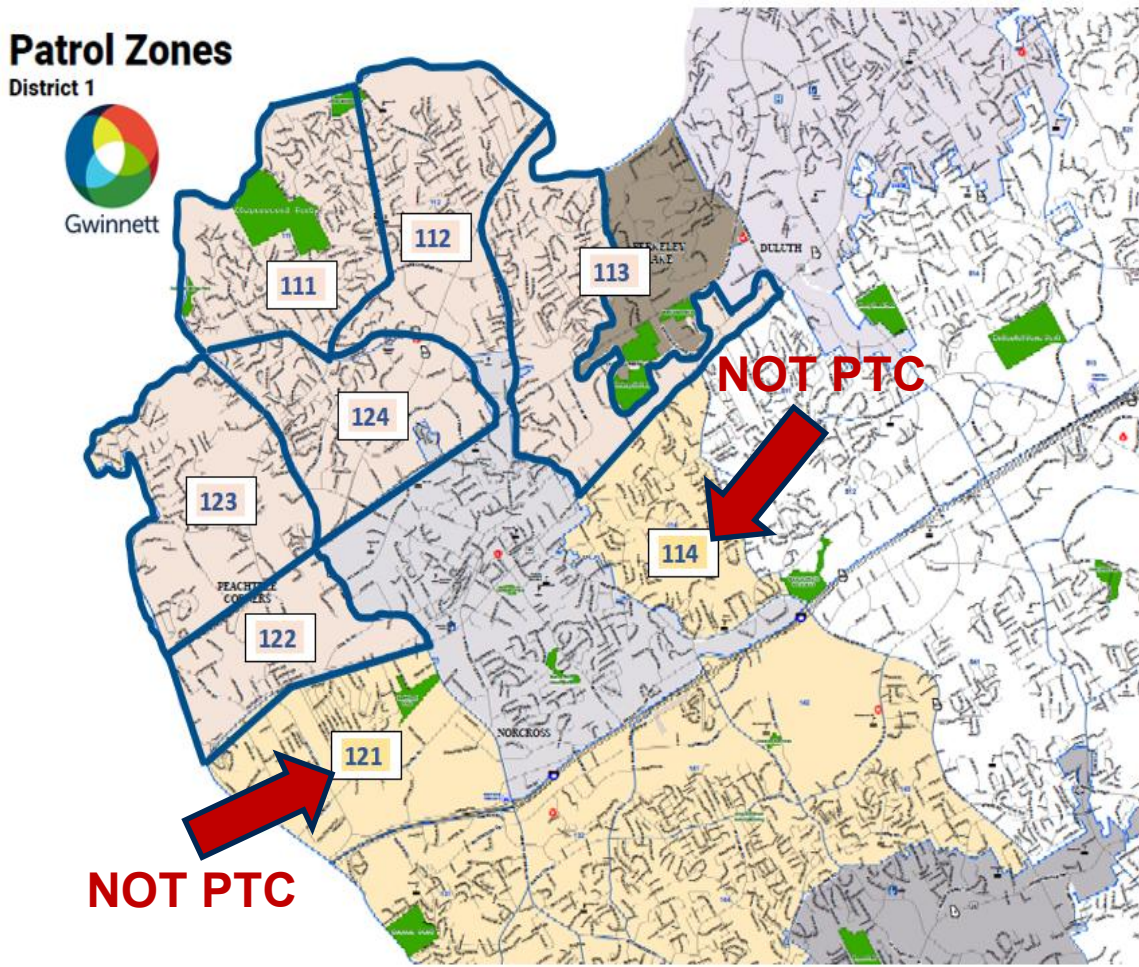

How PTCPD Would Address Specialized Units

- Many Gwinnett cities (Norcross, Duluth, Suwanee, Lawrenceville, etc.) already operate police departments without direct access to GCPD specialized units
- Nearly 80% of cities in Georgia have their own police depts
- PTCPD would:
 - Benefit from federally funded mandate that units like SWAT and EOD be available for regional or multi-jurisdictional use.
 - Leverage mutual aid and partnerships (Aviation, AIU, etc.)
 - Staff a Criminal Investigations Division (CID) to handle homicide, robbery, SVU, ICAC
 - Contribute investigators to FBI, DEA, ATF, ICAC, GMTF and other task forces
- Because Peachtree Corners already operates its own Real-Time Crime Center, PTCPD would begin with a stronger investigative capacity than some peer agencies

Current Concerns – Examples

Corona Billiards Bar & Restaurant
4939 Winters Chapel Road
Atlanta, GA 30360
Sunday, October 13, 2024, 0330 hours

An in-progress fight call involving armed individuals at Corona Billiards. There were no GCPD units initially available to respond. A PTC Marshal was conducting checks of problematic nightly establishments and responded.

Prior to any GCPD Officers arriving, Six (6) Dunwoody PD officers arrived on-scene at approximately 3:32am. A GCPD Officer arrived at approximately 3:39am. After assisting with interviews, Dunwoody PD arrested an individual for DUI and other motor vehicle related charges.



Current Concerns – Examples Continued...

Town Center – Splash Pad / Stage Area Wednesday, May 21, 2025, 5:35pm

City Marshals generated a fight-in-progress call after observing it on video cameras. At the time, Gwinnett 911 advised there were no units available to respond.

Two City Marshals responded from City Hall. The first Marshal arrived at **5:38pm (3 min after dispatch)** and the second Marshal arrived at **5:39pm (4 min after dispatch)**. A GCPD Officer, working in an off-duty capacity at Wesleyan, arrived at **5:44pm (9 min after dispatch)**. Additional GCPD officers responded from West Precinct HQ after roll-call. The first zone officer arrived at **6:04pm (29 min after dispatch)** followed by a supervisor at **5:06pm (31 min after dispatch)**.

Parents that were near the fight intervened and de-escalated this volatile situation. As Marshals arrived, they detained various groups of teenagers that were located in the Town Center and The Forum. The Marshals conducted an investigation and ultimately charged two juvenile females that were involved in the physical altercation.

JUVENILE FIGHT @ TC INCIDENT BREAKDOWN:

- Call was created by City Marshals at **17:35 hours**, dispatch advised they had no T8 (AVAILABLE) Units to respond to the fight.
- Mesa is the first unit on scene at **17:38 hours (3 min after dispatch)**



- Restrepo is the second unit on scene at **17:39 hours** dealing with suspects running across to the Forum from the scene (**4 min after dispatch**)



- Sgt. **Culliver** was the 5th unit on scene and responded to the Forum first at **1806 hours (31 min after dispatch)**



- Picture of the Splash Pad where the fight occurred moments before it started. The splash pad is full of little kids and their families



- Lt. Dunaway, who is an off-duty officer working Wesleyan 1 streetlight over, is the third unit on scene at **17:44 hours (9 min after dispatch)**



- Cpl. Welford was the 4th unit on scene and responded to the Forum first at **1804 hours (29 min after dispatch)**

- Picture of actual fight in progress and the number of small children still at the splash pad and parents running to get their kids and stop the fight from escalating



Current Concerns – Examples Continued...

Lululemon- The Forum Monday, April 7, 2025, 3:19am


Gwinnett 911 received a call regarding a smash & grab burglary in-progress at Lululemon in The Forum. Four (4) GCPD Officers responded, however, only one (1) was in Peachtree Corners (Holcomb Bridge Park) at the time of the call.

Two (2) officers responded from West Precinct HQ, and the last officer responded from Oakbrook Parkway on the other side of I-85. The first officer on-scene arrived **3:27am (8 mins after dispatch)**.


Unfortunately, suspects were able to flee the location in a vehicle they had loaded up with the stolen merchandise.





Current Concerns – Examples Continued...

Residents and Business Owners/Managers will often contact the City Marshal's Office directly or through elected officials to report criminal activity and/or quality of life issues. As a result, the Marshals work with GCPD to ensure these concerns are effectively addressed through COAP (Check Often As Possible) typically for 30 days.













Below is an example of a COAP request...

6135 Peachtree Parkway (Peachtree Marketplace S/C) –

Reports of aggressive panhandling / soliciting outside of multiple businesses.


Request submitted 04-01-2025 no reported checks for 2 months. Reinitiated request 2nd time after more complaints came in.

Have You Spoken with the County?

Any change to the police IGA would require reopening the countywide Service Delivery Strategy (SDS) which must be approved by every city in Gwinnett — making it nearly impossible to change



IGA stipulates GCPD must provide PTC the same level of service they provide to unincorporated Gwinnett so GCPD is already giving PTC the best level of service they can under this structure → no room for improvement



City has communicated concerns (CAD, RMS, timely reports) but has met resistance from County Administration



City will submit a bundled request to the County addressing all problematic areas

- \$11.20 M ⇒ Needed from Property Taxes**

County Property Tax Currently Charged to PTC Property Owners

- PTC Total Assessed Value = \$4.27 B
